DO:

- + Take the Implicit Association Test.
- + Evaluate the voices you listen to and learn from (TV, books, podcasts, social media follows, pastors). What percentage of them are black or people of color?
- + Learn and celebrate African-American traditions and holidays, like Juneteenth.
- + Get involved in your child's school, your place of worship, and politics. Parents who are involved in this way are better able to advocate for fair treatment of racially marginalized groups and raise awareness of race issues in other groups.
- + Confess. Be a role model in owning your biases, feelings, thoughts, mistakes, and areas of wrongdoing.
- + Pay attention to your language. See where any jokes or crude language shows up in your words.
- + Share your story. Let your kids know what it was like for you growing up around this topic of race.
- + Spend your money at black owned businesses.
